1981 I.L.S. LILAC AUCTION AT DES MOINES

The 1981 Lilac Auction was dedicated to the memory of Bernard Harkness, Second President of the Society and Albert Lumley, a long time member of the Board of Directors.

Some 285 lilac plants and lilac related items were donated by the Royal Botanical Gardens, Arnold Arboretum, U.S. National Arboretum, Don Wedge Nursery, and various members, for the auction held on 16 May 1981.

There were 105 different lilacs available for auction, some for the very first time, some rare in commercial outlets, many well known names, as well as many old time "goodies".

After a spirited evening of bidding it was ascertained that \$1,446 had been earned by the society. Many thanks to our treasurer Marie Chaykowski assisted by Board Members Pauline Fiala and Elsie Karas for efficient handling of funds.

Those assisting the undersigned in organizing and delivering plants, spotting bidders were John Carvill, Bill Emerson, Max Peterson and Walter Eickhorst. My sincere thanks for the outstanding job done by these men.

Many thanks are due to our meeting host Bill Heard and the staff of Heard Gardens for receiving, potting where necessary, caring for and delivering plants to the Auction.

Charles Holetich showed colored slides of many of the lilacs as they were put up for auction. His pictures were worth the proverbial "Thousand Words" of oral description.

My wife, Sally Schenker, took notes during the sale. These notes are valuable in preparing reports, and particularly the Report to Charles Holetich and R.B.G. in preparing plants for the 1982 Auction. Her assistance is greatly appreciated.

The generous donation of plants and bidding by members and guests made the 1981 auction an outstanding success, by far the most successful of the 10 held at the annual meetings to date.

Society members who are not attending the annual meetings are missing a golden opportunity to obtain a large variety of quality lilacs at very reasonable prices.

The minutes show what we have done; next year the Board will consider what should be done. If you have ideas please let them be known.

Regional Vice-Presidents Search of Minutes

From the Minutes of the Organizational Meeting:

Articles of Incorporation and Organization

II. Regions:

- A. Region 1. Northeastern U.S. (including: CT, ME, MA, NH, & VT)
- B. Region 2. Eastern U.S. (including: DE, NJ, NY, PA, & MD)
- C. Region 3. Mid-Western U.S. (including: IN, IL, MI, MN, OH, & WI)
- D. Region 4. Western U.S. (including: all states west of the Mississippi River and to the Pacific Ocean Coast)
- E. Region 5. Southern U.S. (including: all the Southern States east of the Mississippi River)
- F. Region 6. Eastern Canada (including: Newfoundland, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario and Quebec provinces)
- G. Region 7. Western Canada (including: Alberta,

British Columbia, Manitoba, Saskatchewan,
The Northwest and Yukon Territories)
H. Region 8. Others (each different country
to be considered as a single region, e.g.
England as one Region, France as another, etc)

Considering cultural climates of various areas these Regions provide the most workable, geographical breakdown for the present. Each Region is encouraged to develop their own officers, newsletter, meetings, flower shows, exhibits, public relations. Representation at the Annual Meeting is under the Regional Vice President who is a 'trustee' of the International Lilag Society.

May 25, 1973 - Page 2

Dr. Rogers suggested that the Western States should be further divided: that the nominating committee be prepared with report in October with suggested names to fill vacancies.

The Executive Committee will study and report on definition of regions.

October 20, 1973 - Page 3

Regional boundaries were discussed according to recommendation by the Executive Committee.

District 4. Mid West: Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and Illinois

District 5. Central-Western

District 6. Far-Western: California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Utah and Nevada

May 24, 1974 - Page 3

It was suggested that the numbering of Chapters be abandoned; that the chapters be known only according to area i.e.: Delhi, Rochester, etc.

The local groups may assess their own members for expenses, and promote the lilac locally as well as I.L.S. goals. Local members should also have I.L.S. membership.

May 22, 1976 - Page 1

Mr. Oakes made a motion that the regional Vice-Presidents should be allowed up to \$25.00 to contact members by telephone, or otherwise. Second Dr. Egolf (there is no record of whether or not this passes - S.S.).

Annual Meeting 1977 - Page 3

Dr. Rogers reported that he had been contacting non-renewing members. Mr. Short reported that he had written personal letters to the non-renewing members in his region.

Mr. Clark spoke for Mrs. Wishart. She has been very active in promoting lilacs. She was responsible for the article in the Flower and Garden magazine. She sponsored a lilac luncheon table in the Lincoln Flower Show.

Dr. Margaretten has held 5 seminars on the coast. He showed Fr. Fiala's slides. He made a trip to Guatemala on which he took lilacs to the National Arboretum there. He also made a trip to the Little Lake Nursery at Willets, California, and was most impressed with their operation.


