VALID PUBLICATION OF NEW CULTIVAR NAMES OF LILAC

In an earlier paper (LILAC NEWSLETTER 10(1):2-4; January 1984) Dr. James S. Pringle discusses effective and valid publication of botanical names under the International Code of Botanical Nomenclature. The basic requirements for valid publication of cultivar names are quite similar, but are governed by the International Code of Nomenclature for Cultivated Plants, often referred to as the "Cultivated Code".

Valid publication of a new cultivar name requires that such a name be formed in concordance with the Cultivated Code and with Articles 27 through 32 in particular; only the highlights can be discussed here. New cultivar names must be in the vernacular, not in Latin. New cultivar names should consist of one or two words and must not consist of more than three words (an abbreviation or numeral counts Certain forms of new cultivar names as a word). cannot be accepted and would be invalidly published. For instance, the botanical name of a genus or the common name of a species used as a cultivar name may lead to confusion (e.g. Syringa 'Daphne' could be referred to as Daphne 'Lilac'; Syringa 'Daphne Pink' is less likely to lead to confusion). It is unacceptable to combine parts of the Latin epithets of two parent species to form a new name for a cultivar of hybrid origin (e.g. 'Wolflexa' must not be used as a cultivar name for a hybrid between S. wolfii and S. reflexa). New cultivar names should not contain abbreviations, except for the abbreviation 'Mrs.' in English; names likley to be confused with existing names, and excessively long names should be avoided (e.g. 'Kenneth W. Berdeen 2nd' consists of more than three words, contains 2 abbreviations,

is excessively long and could be confused with the existing 'Ken Berdeen'). "In order to be valid, publication of a cultivar name is effected by the distribution or availability to the public of printed or similarly duplicated matter." "In order to be valid, the publication of a cultivar name on or after 1 January 1959 must be accompanied by a description." Such a description may be published in any language, but "it is recommended that, if a cultivar description is in a language not using Latin or Cyrillic script, a translation summary of the cultivar description be provided in a language using one of these scripts." "The description should, when possible, contain particulars to distinguish the cultivar from related cultivars Parentage and history of the cultivar concerned and the name of the originator (breeder, discoverer) or introducer should be stated when known." The. publication of a cultivar name, on or after 1 January 1959, is valid only if the printed matter, including

trade catalogues, is clearly stated. It is recommended that "copies of printed or similarly duplicated matter containing new cultivar names should be sent to the appropriate registration authorities and to suitable libraries."

"Publication of a cultivar name is not valid if against the expressed wish of its originator (breeder, discoverer) or his assignee." "A cultivar name is not validly published and must be rejected if the cultivar of which it pruports to be the name neither does not nor did exist."

The principle of priority has been accepted also for cultivar names. The general starting point of valid publication of cultivar names is Philip Miller's The Gardeners Dictionary, Ed. 6, 1752. For a number of plant groups separate starting points have been established; at the XII International Horticultural Congress in 1938, in Berlin, McKelvey's "The Lilac: a Monograph", 1928, was designated as the starting point and "proposed as standard of nomenclature" for Syringa.

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Two Steps to Valid Publication

of a New Lilac Cultivar Name

- 1. Submit a proposed new cultivar name to the Registrar of the International Registration Authority (IRA) for cultivar names in Syringa to ascertain that the name is in concordance with the Cultivated Code. It is recommended that the new name be registered.
- 2. Publish the new cultivar name with the description of the new cultivar, its parentage, history, and the name(s) of its originator (breeder, discoverer) and introducer. Publication may be done independently or it may be effected by inclusion in one of the lists of lilac registrations published periodically by the IRA for Syringa.

Shelburne Museum will welcome ILS members with a free ride on the S.S. Ticonderoga. This vessel is the last vertical beam passenger and freight sidewheel steamer intact in the United States. There are marine prints, paintings and photographs as well as a film which is shown daily. In 1963 the Ticonderoga was declared a National Historic Landmark.

Other points of interest at the Museum include: Steam Locomotive 'Grand Isle', a hunting lodge with big game trophies and Indian artifacts, Blacksmith and Wheelwright Shop, a mid-1800 farm home, needlework center with quilts, costumes, embroideries etc., a toy shop and much more!
