Nebraska

Continuing the series of lists of lilacs that do well in a particular region, we move to the plains of Nebraska and a list prepared by Max Peterson.

Of the list, Max writes "The lilac list contains both <u>vulgaris</u> and <u>hyacinthiflora</u>. I haven't named any of the other species as they all seem to do well here, but not really outstanding. Prestoniae do not do well in this country. Neither do any of the other big-leafed lilacs. The hot August winds and low humidities scorch and sometimes make the leaves drop. They bloom fairly well, but by the last of July they seem to look fairly miserable."
